BIBLE READING – John 11-18

'I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I

know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So, there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason, the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father.'




Jesus said, "I am the Good Shepherd. The Good Shepherd lays down his life for the sheep." (verse 11)

I think that these must rank as some of the most stirring words that Jesus ever said – I am the Good Shepherd who lays down his life for his sheep, for us. This goes to the heart of the Gospel message, what it means for us to follow Christ, to live as he lived, to pick up his Cross and follow him.

And he died for all, so that those who live might live no longer for themselves, but for him who died and was raised for them. (2 Corinthians 5:15).

Jesus is that Good Shepherd, Our Great High Priest who has gone before us. As John writes earlier in the Gospel, "The Word became flesh and made his



dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth." (John 1:14)

Today's message is very simple really – to think on what it means for us here and now that Jesus is our Good Shepherd. So many things follow because he is that Good Shepherd - earlier in this same chapter we read,

"...the sheep hear His voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out... and the sheep follow Him because they know His voice..." (v.4).

And all this time, the sheep are living under the shadow of the Cross, in the same way that Our Lord Jesus has laid down his life for us, so we too lay our lives down for him and for each other - we no longer live for ourselves but for him. That's who we live for, that's who we fight for, and who we are prepared if need be to die for.

Now I know you might be thinking, but Mike here we are in sleepy old Preston, that all sounds a bit dramatic ...what do you mean to live for Christ, to fight for Christ, to fight the good fight, and yes sometimes that means the way of the cross, the shadow of the cross over our lives. Well, it doesn't sound much fun, I don't much like the sound of that!


Yet listen again to what Jesus says, "I am the Good Shepherd. The Good Shepherd lays down his life for the sheep." (v.11)

Quite simply, God's own dear Son the Lord Jesus Christ gave his life on the Cross for you and for me, his blood shed for us all. And it is by his death and resurrection on the third day through the power of the Holy Spirit that we know this new life in Christ Jesus. All our sins forgiven, washed clean by his most precious blood.

The Lord Jesus Christ has done of all this for you and for me.

Really - when push comes to shove - isn't there only ever one true proper response? If someone were to give their own life for you, wouldn't there always from that day onwards that sense that you owe them a debt that you can never ever fully repay? That someone loved you so much and loves you still, and calls you by name to come and follow.

To follow the one true Good Shepherd, Our Lord Jesus Christ, who lays down his life for his sheep. **Amen.**
