BIBLE READING – Philippians 4: 10-23

I rejoiced greatly in the Lord that at last you renewed your concern for me. Indeed, you were concerned, but you had no opportunity to show it. I am not saying this because I am in need, for I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances. I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want. I can do all this through him who gives me strength.

Yet it was good of you to share in my troubles. Moreover, as you Philippians know, in the early days of your acquaintance with the gospel, when I set out from Macedonia, not one church shared with me in

the matter of giving and receiving, except you only; for even when I was in Thessalonica, you sent me aid more than once when I was in need. Not that I desire your gifts; what I desire is that more be credited to your account. I have received full payment and have more than enough. I am amply supplied, now that I have received from Epaphroditus the gifts you sent. They are a fragrant offering, an acceptable sacrifice, pleasing to God. And my God will meet all your needs according to the riches of his glory in Christ Jesus.


To our God and Father be glory for ever and ever. Amen.


Greet all God's people in Christ Jesus. The brothers and sisters who are with me send greetings. All God's people here send you greetings, especially those who belong to Caesar's household.

THIS WEEK'S MESSAGE - written by Peter

Today's message brings us to the end of Philippians. I hope you have enjoyed the series, which we entitled 'Joy in Adversity.' The word 'joy' or 'rejoice' appears sixteen times in the whole letter, which is rather a lot. Paul found many things to rejoice in despite the fact that he was chained up in prison. Looking back on the last ten weeks, here's a summary of some of the things that brought Paul joy.





What a lot of joy!! Paul said that he had 'learned the secret of being content in any and every situation,' which is surely a secret we would all like to know. The answer, it would seem, is to find our joy and pleasure in the same sort of things that brought delight to Paul – his relationship with Jesus, living for the Gospel, his friendship and partnership with others, and the hope of his glorious eternal future. By making these things our focus and our joy we can endure hardships just as he did. It is possible to find inner contentment, whether we are in need or in plenty.

When Somebody Cares

It has been apparent throughout Paul's letter that the Philippians really were the apple of his eye, his 'joy and crown' (4:1). Why was this? Evidently they had proved their love for him through their concern and generosity when Paul was in need, over and above the other churches that Paul had planted. For Paul it wasn't about his material needs being met, or his desire to receive gifts. What moved him was just knowing that they cared, and he celebrated that their heartfelt generosity would be 'credited' to them in the next life (4:17).

Philippians 4-10

Isn't this so true to life. When someone shows us that they care, it is not the thing itself that we really treasure, but the love we have been shown. We can bring joy to others through our words, but we can really spread joy when we show that we care in practical ways. I spoke at the start of this series about having a joy that is contagious, like a virus...The most effective way to pass on joy to someone else is through practical kindness, and acts of generosity.

For joy to be really spread around, we must let it work both ways. Sat in his prison cell, Paul was forced to let others bless him. He couldn't do much else, aside from write a rather good letter! Most of us prefer to be the giver of charity than the recipient of it, but if we don't allow others to bless us as well then we rob them of the opportunity to share their joy with us, and to practice their love for God. This has been driven home to me a couple of times in the past week, where individuals have told me to stop offering to do everything myself, and let *them* show a bit of sacrifice. And why wouldn't I? Paul allowed Timothy to serve wholeheartedly, and he let Epaphroditus 'almost die' for the work of Christ. He didn't get in their way.

So like Paul, let us rejoice when others show that they care, and when others make sacrifices for Christ. We can give, and we can receive, and in both instances – we rejoice!

May we not quickly forget these things, but rather learn from them and take them with us, to help us be a better people, society and nation in the future.
