

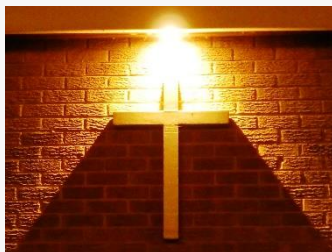

Lian's Story

One of our confirmation candidates on November 28th was Lian Harris from Emmanuel. Lian shared her story within the service, and has kindly allowed us to print it in our magazine.



So, what led me to the point I am now. Last week I saw Ant Middleton, those of you who know him, know he is the very positive, straight talking SAS bloke. He has overcome many barriers in life including a prison sentence and remains heavily positive he protracts his success merely to a positive mindset.

I too have many similarities to him, I myself have overcome many barriers in life, and surround myself with positive people now. However, I am of the strong belief that when one is rock bottom, it is impossible to merely flip a negative mindset into a positive all alone. There must be a greater force and a need to want to be helped to rise again.

I am testimony to this, when I was rock bottom which wasn't very long ago. In April 2019 I received a 27-month prison sentence for breaching a court order, for which I served 14 months in prison. The chaplain came to introduce herself, Elaine Wykes a name I will never forget, and I would say 'don't talk to me about God.' I was very angry with the world, thinking 'how did this happen to me?' I had also had a difficult childhood and felt like everything was against me. I truly believed "I was one of God's jokes!" I would still talk to Elaine once a week, but refused to enter the Chapel, I would only go as far as her office.

I was in a privileged position compared with some of the other women there. I had a home, two lovely children, I was going back to uni to finish my degree. I even had a job to go back to. I was literally walking back to where I had left off. Whereas for others there was ambiguity around their lives. Therefore, I had a rebellious attitude. I thought I didn't need to play by their rules, I didn't need a reference from the prison service, it would be a part of life that I would

leave behind and move on. As a result of my bad attitude, I ended up receiving extra 4 months on my sentence. It was devastating at the time, but through it something amazing happened. As my release date was approaching, I knew that I had to develop as a person, or I would be here again and again.

I was getting flashbacks to my childhood, and a near death experience I'd had some years ago. Both of which I barely didn't even think about. My early childhood had been boxed off years ago.

Then just three weeks before I was due to leave, I had a strong overwhelming feeling one night that God was there. It's hard to explain, but I felt something which can only be described as a spiritual feeling.

I knew I had to speak to the chaplain the next day. The feeling was too strong to ignore. Me of all people, opened to the idea of exploring God! I had asked an officer to contact Elaine the chaplain, I needed to see her urgently, I needed to enter the chapel to discuss this newfound feeling.

I had poured my heart out to her, about the flashbacks I had been getting for a while, about the feeling I had just experienced, but most of all what landed me there in the first place. I started to see my whole situation differently and came to the realisation that actually, I didn't feel anger towards the people involved anymore, I pitied them. One individual in particular I now pray for, I never thought I would be at that point.

This was the biggest revelation, to Elaine, more importantly to me. I recognised that I needed to change my mindset, had God recognised it too? I recall asking Elaine if I was going crazy, am I going to be sectioned when I leave? She reassured me it is normal. I felt overwhelming excitement, Elaine had explained that it is the work of the Holy spirit. It was all too much for me to take in, but I definitely wanted more of it.

She gave me the Holy Bible to read, I had asked her to bless it, she also gave me a book of common prayer. She suggested that I start with the letters from

Paul. I started reading immediately, I had so many questions for her, 'why is there different versions of the bible'? 'If Jesus was born in the middle east, does that not make him Islamic'? she answered my questions without hesitation, but I still had a very small inkling of doubt, I recall thinking, OK, but she went to theological college for training.

It then came to the day I was leaving, she specifically came in early that day, even though it was mid pandemic, she said 'I'm going to hug you.' It was rather dramatic the day I left.

I came home, and thought now what? I didn't want that to be the end of my journey, I still had questions I needed answering, I still needed to know more. I had no idea where to turn, there was no way I was just going rock up at a church.

I phoned Elaine, I explained that I didn't know what to do. Within half an hour of that phone call, I received a text message from someone called Peter, who wanted to call round and meet me.

So, now I had to explain everything to my daughter Michaila, that a vicar was coming round, her reaction surprised me, she wasn't hysterically laughing, nor did she dismiss it as a joke. She simply said 'OK, I will be with you, and I will come to church with you.'

We both met Peter and Joyce, that afternoon. I said to Peter 'I need to explore more.' I remember walking with Peter one day and asking him the same questions I had asked Elaine, (as no two people are completely consistent). Again without hesitation, he answered with the same consistency, which left me feeling even more euphoric if that was possible. It must absolutely be true.

Moving forward, I have been involved with the church for over a year now, it has truly changed my life, I have friends through church with the same mindset, I am proud of my faith now, I am a church goer, friends outside church are more accepting now.

One thing that has stood out for me, was during one of the confirmation sessions with the children, a young man stated that 'Christians are happier people.' It is absolutely true, only a little help from God, the Holy spirit and Jesus can heal a negative mind and turn it into a positive. I couldn't have achieved what I have this year without my friends. I got through surgery abroad, survived 17 hours on a plane with my son, and attained a 2:1 in my degree, and I am pleased to say that I will be a bigger part of God's house as I get confirmed.

Most importantly, I will be forever grateful to Emmanuel Church, and to Peter, Joyce and many others who I have got to know on a personal level, who I call friends.

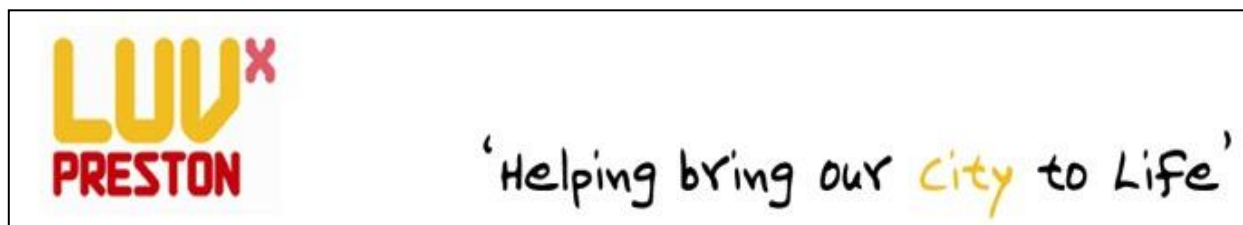

A View from the Pew

This is the time of year when the boxes of Christmas decorations, carefully put away last year, are retrieved so we can re-use the contents. It struck me that the most versatile of our decorations is the balloon. It comes in all sorts of shapes, sizes, and colours; it can be hung singly or in bunches; or just to play with. Balloons are 'happy' things. Is there anyone who can resist tapping a balloon as it floats by? You can do so many funny things with balloons. You can't, for instance, blow up a yo-yo, or distend its neck so that it makes rude or remarkable noises that double people up with laughter. You can't chase a pogo stick or pit pat a bicycle in the air.

Balloons are amusingly eccentric – they hardly ever go where one wants them – they are fleeting and elusive things. In the same way that one tries to capture a balloon, or pat it as it floats by so one strives to capture or touch the elusive delights of happiness. Churchwardens Update

Dear Friends,

It's been a while since my last update as we had the magazine printed and distributed in September. So here are the headlines in church life.

Social events

The harvest Supper took place in October, it was well attended and was enjoyed by all. We raised £110.

Christmas fair, whilst it was kept low key because of the uncertainties around the changing covid rules the social committee did a terrific job and thanks to everyone's support raised a total of £717.

We are hoping to plan a social calendar for the coming year which will

provide more notice of what will be going on around the church

The Christmas events are planned, and the times displayed on posters around church.

Quinquennial Inspection and 5-year Electrical inspection

The two inspections have taken place and there are a number of issues to address in the short and long term. For further detail please contact Debra Foster.

Many of the recommendations made could be carried out by a team of enthusiastic DIY volunteers which would save the church a significant amount of money.

If anyone is interested in being part of a DIY group, or even managing a small group of volunteers we would love to hear from you.

We are all keen to invest in the building to keep our church and community events going so please if you have a bit of time and enthusiasm step forward and give us a hand in maintaining our facilities.

To express interest please give your name to the Peter, Hilary or Debra or drop us an email or text mentioning enthusiastic DIY.

In the new year a list of jobs will be posted on the notice board, and you can put your name against any you fancy. We will provide any materials for the jobs.

Covid Security

- We continue to sanitise our hands on arrival in church.
- We are continuing to wear masks whilst moving around and during the service, but cannot stop anyone from removing their mask once seated.
- The communion rail is being used for communion, please leave space between the people next to you.
- The collection plate will again be passed around during the service.

- Congregational singing is permitted if masks are worn.
- Coffee is now being served on Thursday and Sunday.

If anyone has any comments or concerns, please ask the welcomers, or contact the churchwardens directly.

Mission Priorities

The Alpha course has been running at Lea Club and has attracted a number of people wanting to explore faith more.

Confirmation services took place on 28th November.

Messy Church for Christingle is taking place on 11th December.

A small group from the PCC will review how we can provide better pastoral support to our congregation outside the church services. There are a number of people who are housebound or whose mental or physical health has deteriorated especially through the pandemic who may benefit from help in this area. The progress of this has been held up due to unforeseen circumstances, however the meeting has been rearranged in the new year.

We raised £106.25 for the Bishop's Harvest Appeal.

Finance

We are still carefully monitoring income and expenditure against our budget.

We would like to again say a huge thank you to those of you that continue to be so generous in your regular giving to the church. This is greatly appreciated.

As at the end of November 2021:

- Expected total income was £27,787 and our actual income was £25,567.
- Expected total expenditure was £33,369 and our actual expenditure was £20,304 (note some expenditure is in an annual payment i.e., service of

fire extinguishers / alarm etc and many are due in November and December and a large portion of our reserves was spent on the roof repairs).

- We have only paid £4,815 of Parish Share to date, to achieve a £20K payment we should have paid £16,600. We have reinstated a standing order to pay £500 per month going forward and are supplementing this with cheque payments where funds allow.
- Drain fund currently stands at £316.74
- Giving is continuing to show signs of increasing as more people attend church and life events are recommencing.
- Hall users have returned although Slimming World have given notice and moved in November.
- Social and fundraising events are returning.

Account balances at end of October 2021:

Current account	£7,753.43
Savings account	£763.68

Peter has been successful in two funding applications to allow us to purchase and install an interactive whiteboard for use in the back room. This is being totally funded from these successful bids.

Please continue to pray with us that we continue to take the church in the right direction and that we will be successful in keeping a thriving church community in Lea.
