- **Day 1** Read the book Mad About Minibeasts. Write 10 sets of rhyming words from the story. Can you think of more rhyming words of your own?
- **Day 2** Pick your favourite mini beast and draw a picture of it. Label your picture with information from the book or from your own research.
- **Day 3** Go on a mini beast safari and find five different kinds of minibeast. Take notes about each minibeast you find, examine it noting the size, shape, colour, number of legs, eyes and how it moves. You can draw a picture too.
- **Day 4** Make your own mini book of minibeasts by folding a piece of paper into a booklet. On each page draw and write a fact file about each mini beast you found on your safari.
- **Day 5** Invent your own minibeast. You can draw it or make a model using recycled materials or playdough. Write a description of your minibeast. What does it look like? How does it move? What does it like to eat? Try to use lots of adjectives in your writing.

Remember to use your capital letters, full stops, finger spaces between words and your best handwriting.

KS1 Earth and Space
Where do we live?
Preston, England, Europe, our world, Earth – solar system.


Explore the "shooting for the stars" PowerPoint about our solar system.

How many planets are there?

Explore position in our solar system and where the Sun and moon are in relation to our planet. (star, planet, moon)

Complete the labelling activity showing planets and sun and moon.

Our day length changes depending on our orbit around the sun and how close the Earth is to the Sun at different times of the year. Our planet is orbited by the moon and we orbit the Sun (star) at the centre of our solar system.

History Edith Cavell

Who Was Edith Cavell?

Edith Cavell was a nurse who helped soldiers in World War One in 1914.

Look at the Edith Cavell information (pdf) document on the home learning page.

World War One: Look at the map that is included and discuss the different countries which were involved in World War One in 1914.

How Did Edith Help Soldiers? Discuss how Edith treated soldiers from both sides and how this was controversial at the time.

What does this tells us about her personality and character? What sort of person was she?

skills which you can use to help others.

Through this resource, you'll meet six characters as they use their first aid skills to help others. You can watch films and take part in activities to learn and practise first aid skills.

You'll also learn about kindness, how to cope and keep calm, and how to keep yourself safe. Followed by tips on sharing what you've learned with others.

Start with the activities on the first page and then choose from the first aid skills below. Work through each section at your own pace and choose what is suitable for you and your child to learn.

- Simple actions can make a difference.
- Anyone can learn to give first aid in different situations.
- First Aid Champions lessons enable children to feel confident that they can help.
- If children are confident, they will be inspired to help. People have accidents or are suddenly taken ill every day of the year. By learning first aid, children are empowered to look after themselves and each other.





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PE - Catching skills



Creative catch

Play catch with anything soft, eg balloon, tea towel, scarf, soft toy, ball of wool.

Counting catch

Using something soft, count how many times you can catch without dropping. Record your score, then try to beat it.



Clapping catch

Try throwing and catching a soft object on the spot. Between throwing it and catching it you should clap your hands. You'll need to clap quickly! Try doing another action between throwing and catching, eg touch your toes, spin around.

How to catch a ball.

- 1. Stand with feet slightly apart.
- 2. Watch the ball.
- 3. Get your hands ready.
- 4. Reach out to meet the ball.
- 5. Hold the ball tightly and bring it into your body.
