It has been so long since we've been together as a class, some of you might have forgotten the amazing things we've done this year. Here are some highlights: In English, we've explored a range of novels. We thoroughly enjoyed getting stuck into The Midnight Fox and putting ourselves in Tom's shoes, as we found our own midnight animals. We all loved getting trapped on the side of a mountain with Bear Grylls in The Volcano Challenge. Our own challenges ranged from mountains, deserts and oceans but we all pushed the characters to their limits.

When we looked at play scripts using Asterix in England, we applied our knowledge of Romans, had fun with names like Caesar Salad or Emperor Penguin and created some very amusing plays about Asterix's endeavours in England. We

began to use the thrilling novel Escape from Rome. Each of you really empathised well with the children fleeing Rome in the middle of the night, only to arrive at their uncle's burning house in Londinium.

In Science, we carried out a range of experiments linked with sound. We explored how sound vibrates air particles, using a big speaker and Ed Sheeran. We investigated how the length of objects impacts on pitch, using straws. There was a very loud lesson creating paper bangers and we all created a pair of ear defenders. We became amateur school electricians, creating a range of circuits.

In the Spring term, we explored Italy and compared that country to the UK. We applied some of our mapping skills and thought about human geography aspects as well.
